Dear Parishioners and Visitors,

Today's Gospel is one of the best known parables of Jesus. Even though it is usually called *The Prodigal* Son, perhaps it could be better called *The Forgiving* Father. A father has two sons. In a callous way, the younger son demands his inheritance, turns his back on his family and his responsibilities, leaves and squanders his fortune. Abandoned by his "friends," he is forced to take a humiliating job. Unable to take any more, he returns home with a rehearsed speech to tug at his father's heartstrings. But before he can say anything, the father welcomes him in a way beyond our understanding. The older son is angry and berates his father, but the father stands firm in his decision.

It is a powerful picture of God's tremendous mercy and forgiveness. But we can look at this story in another way; it's also about freedom, God's and ours. Our free will gives us the choice to take the high road or the low road, for grace or for sin. The young man in the story chooses the low road, and his father freely chooses to forgive him, carte blanche, for everything. The only person in the story who doesn't exercise his freedom is the older brother. A free person can show compassion, but the older son is so mastered by the spirits of anger, self-righteousness, and a rigid sense of justice, that all he can do is separate himself from his father and brother.

It is so easy to take the road of either of the brothers: selfishness of the younger and self-pitying of the older. But to take the road of the father is not easy. It is why we have Lent. It is why we need to turn to the Lord for enlightenment, forgiveness and strength. This Monday's Reconciliation Service is a time to celebrate God's mercy. All are invited to come share in this gift! $\sim Fr. Jim$





Yes we can, with God's help

Our faith might be more conditional than we'd like to admit. We may expect it to magically solve all our problems, perhaps by way of miraculous signs and wonders such as the Galileans expected of Jesus. It's understandable, but that is not how faith works. It's not about a miracle fix but rather about facing and resolving life's challenges with the confidence that we do not face them alone— God is at our side. So rather than hope for a miracle today, work on resolving a problem yourself, with the confidence and serenity that God is with you.

MEMORIAL OF FRANCIS OF PAOLA, HERMIT

One and many

The funny thing about hermits is that they tend to attract a crowd. Born in southern Italy in 1416, Saint Francis of Paola lived as a hermit for five years before gathering some companions with whom he founded an order inspired by his namesake, Saint Francis, called the "Minims"—the "minis," the least. He wasn't the first person whose desire to focus on God attracted people who wanted the same thing. Try to find a balance between solitude and sociability, between encountering God one-on-one and with others.

Glad to be of help

The feeling that you are doing God's will on earth activates a deep source of inner peace. By contrast, the thought that you really should be doing something else creates a low-grade feeling of anxiety that you can ignore for only so long. Eventually the unease accumulates until life becomes a heavy burden, or you get sick—or both. Your fear might be that God wants you to go to some hard place, to do some difficult task. Not so. As theologian Frederick Buechner put it, God calls you to the place where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet. To find that

place of deep gladness you have to go within and you have to listen. Lent is the perfect time to do both.

MEMORIAL OF SIDORE OF SEVILLE, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH Sacred sites

When the church was looking for a patron saint of the internet, it hit upon Isidore. One of the most learned people of his time (the sixth and seventh centuries), Isidore, among his many accomplishments as a church leader, put together a 20-volume encyclopedia covering just about everything from agriculture to grammar. His position at the center of this "web" of knowledge made him the most likely candidate to be patron of the internet. To find saintly patronage for something new, the church looked to someone from a long time past. May Isidore guide you wisely as you explore the web we call the internet.

MEMORIAL OF VINCENT FERRER, PRIEST: DAY OF ABSTINENCE People of good faith sometimes disagree

The church has been through some rough stretches over the centuries. One such period occurred during the papal schism in the 1300s when several men claimed to be the true pope at the same time. So complex and divisive were the politics that two holy leaders living in Spain at the same time—Saints Vincent Ferrer and Catherine of Siena—supported opposing claimants to the papacy. Ferrer later said the schism had such a depressing effect as to ruin his health for life. Though at times you must stand on principle, prolonged divisions hurt everyone. In your own family, neighborhood, and church, be a uniter, not a divider.


