

Palm Sunday, 2020

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

How different this is from EVERY OTHER Palm Sunday. In previous years, circumstances would have kept some people away; sickness or weather conditions are two that come to mind. But the numbers coming would outweigh those who could not come. This year, all the churches on Long Island are closed due to COVID-19. The pews are empty. Palms are blessed but cannot be distributed until sometime in the future. Only Fr. Paul, Dan Crews (our Music Director) and I are in the church for all the Holy Week services. The very heart of our Catholic faith, gathering around the Altar of the Lord to share the Word and receive Holy Communion, cannot happen!

This year's Passion account comes from the Gospel according to Matthew (26:14-27:66). I invite you to read it on your own, even if you hear it at a Mass on TV or the internet. It's a special way to enter into Holy Week. In this time of pandemic, the scene of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane best expresses where we find ourselves. Here is a short excerpt:

[Jesus] said to them, "My soul is sorrowful even to death. Remain here and keep watch with me." He advanced a little and fell prostrate in prayer, saying, "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet, not as I will, but as you will." When he returned to his disciples, he found them asleep. [Matthew 26: 38-40]

What Jesus experiences resonates with the crosses we are carrying this year. <u>Deep sorrow</u> for the people who are infected and those who are putting their lives on the line to help them; for the distress being caused to untold families as they face a loss of income; for not being able to have the usual religious and family gatherings that make this



time of year so special. Aloneness by having to follow "shelter-in-place" orders; being unable to interact in normal ways; struggling with boredom or coping in close quarters with others.

As always, the Lord offers us his way to go forward. Honesty in prayer to God regarding those crosses ["My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me."] and acknowledging our lack of control ["yet not as I will, but as you will."] This is not saying that the pandemic is God's Will. God never wills harm or hurt to anyone. But it is saying that God's path is not determined by what we want. I urge you to keep that image of Jesus in the Garden in the forefront of your mind in this unique and painful Holy Week.

From the Bishop's Office, March 22, 2020

... in compliance with the Executive Order of the Governor of New York State, no further public liturgies are permitted until further notice. This includes funerals, weddings, baptisms, and any other cause for gathering people together in the church,

Emergency sacraments are permitted, as always, but while exercising the proper health precautions. Burial services may be offered if possible, while observing all safe distance precautions, and should be done at the grave site. Wake services should no longer be conducted. Both wakes and funeral (memorial) Masses can be postponed.

Distribution of Palms for Palm Sunday. Pastors should not plan to distribute Palms or make them available at this time. Palms will be blessed in parish churches on Palm Sunday and will be made available to the faithful at a later date.
















Lenten Information

In keeping with the spirit of penance, Catholics are asked to observe the following practices:

Good Friday is a day of fast* and abstinence**
All Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence**
*Fasting: All between the ages of 18 and 59 may eat only one full meal & two small meals on these days (no snacks).

**Abstinence: All from the age of seven onwards abstain from meat on these days.

Illness always exempts people from these requirements.



Confirmation Preparation

Confirmation I

All students will continue with their lessons starting with completing Chapter 8.

Students can continue with chapters 9 and 10. Since this is an unprecedented time, when we meet again we will be having a year end interview that will include a book check, Saint report, Baptismal reflection, Confirmation name report, sponsor form, The Nativity movie reflection and community service hours log and reflection. If you have completed any of these they have been recorded. There will be more instructions in the next bulletin.

Confirmation II

As we have discussed in class, this is the holiest week of the Church Year. We begin with the Triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. By the end of the week, the same people who lined the streets for his entry, line them again, this time spitting at him, mocking him and calling for his crucifixion. How often do we make fun of those who try their best to do what God asks of them?

We celebrate on Holy Thursday how he came to serve (not be served) and that we are also called to serve (eg. "Community Service"). Watch the news, see how some people are so selfish they do not realize that their actions can cause someone else's illness or death. What have you done this week to thank or help someone for what they do for you?

On Good Friday, we will remember the events of his trial and execution. How he held his head high as he was stripped, whipped and made to carry his cross to the place of execution. We sometimes feel we too are carrying a cross. How do you handle the challenges in your life? With fortitude, with compassion, in prayer, or with "that attitude"?

The Vigil is the longest liturgy of the year. Our lives, awaiting our return to our creator, seems long. When we look back from the eternal to the "present" the wait seems so short. But Easter reminds us of love's victory over hate, grace's victory over sin, the Trinity keeping their promise. How do we keep ours?

Be sure to report any incidents of scams or mail fraud to the Inspection Service at <u>uspis.gov</u> or by calling the number at the bottom of this flyer.

For updated information and developments, please follow <u>Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)</u>. You may also get more information about government response from **GSA**.

- Be aware of charity scams
 - Only contribute to established organizations.
- Don't click on links in emails

 Never click on links in emails from sources you
 don't know, especially those that claim to be from
 Centers for Disease Control (CDC) or World Health
 Organization (WHO).
- There currently is no cure or treatment
 Be wary of offers for vaccines, pills, potions,
 lotions, or other products that claim to cure or
 treat Coronavirus (COVID-19).
- Don't give out financial information

 Don't give your financial information or personal information to anyone you don't know and don't trust.
- Resist pressure tactics

 Don't be pressured into making immediate financial decisions.
- Consult with a trusted friend or family member before making a payment.

Here are the most recent scams to be aware of:

Testing Scams

Fake at-home test kits are being sold or going door to door performing fake tests for money.

Supply Scams

Creating fake shops, websites, social media account and e-mail addresses selling all medical/ cleaning supplies in high demand when in fact they do not have any of these supplies and just take the victims money.

Provider Scams (Similar to the Grandparent Scam)

Individuals posing by email or phone pretending to be a doctor and hospital that treated a friend or relative for Covid-19 and are demanding payment for the treatment.

App Scams

Creating mobile apps designed to track the spread of COVID-19 to insert malware on a persons phone that will compromise the device and personal information.

Investment Scams

Offering investments into companies claiming that the products or services of the companies can prevent, detect or cure COVID-19 and the stock will dramatically increase.


