

Dear Parishioners and Visitors,

For most of us, the closest we come to being aware of the Trinity is when we make the Sign of the Cross: "In the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen." Most Holy Trinity Sunday is an opportunity to think some more about this truth that Jesus revealed.

In the Bible, the three great undertakings of God: creation, redemption and sanctification are revealed. When the original work of creation is distorted by sin, God does not choose to throw one world away in favor of another (First Sunday of Lent: Adam and Eve's disobedience). God makes the choice for redemption instead—to save what would otherwise be lost (Fourth Sunday of Lent: "you were once in darkness, but now you are in light"), even if it means going through the garbage of human sinfulness (Palm Sunday: "Jesus emptied himself, taking a form of a slave...becoming obedient even to death, death on a cross"). What is redeemed is also restored by the power of holiness (Fifth Sunday of Easter: "You are 'a chosen race, a royal priesthood...so that you may announce the praises' of him who called you out of



darkness into his wonderful light"). The sanctified world is not simply the world made new again, but something even better (Pentecost: "No one can say, 'Jesus is Lord,' except by the Holy Spirit. There are different kinds of spiritual gifts but the same Spirit; there are different forms of service but the same Lord."). The sanctified world has been loved back into shape.

The Three Persons/One God work in harmony in these undertakings. Since we are part of the world that is created, redeemed, and restored, and because we are children of God in the likeness of God, we are called to live the same unity of identity and purpose in the work of our hands. At a time in our nation's life when differences are being highlighted, encouraged, and exploited, may our faith in the Trinity's unity in diversity be our light.


We offer the Act of Spiritual Communion (lower right) for those of you celebrating with us from your homes so that we may all pray it together at Communion time.

St. Margaret of Scotland Parish - Coming Back

As we are all aware, the closings of so many aspects of our lives were very sudden. However, since we have reached the milestone of Long Island Phase One re-opening, I wanted to let you know how we are faring here at St. Margaret of Scotland Church as of May 31st and give you an idea of what we are thinking about. Fr. Jim

Please Keep in Mind:

- (1) Due to the demands of cleaning and disinfecting the church in this pandemic time, we cannot plan on our parish schedules being the same as usual.
- (2) Both Fr. Paul and Fr. Jim are in the higher risk age population (i.e., over 65 years old).
- (3) The decisions being worked on by the Diocese to resume worship and activities will be guided by the same concern for the common good and the protection of the vulnerable used for the closings in March. But, unlike them, the implementations cannot be sudden and all at once.
- (4) According to current Diocesan rules, Holy Communion is not available at any liturgical celebration (including funerals). Diocesan procedures are being prepared.

Masses:

- Our weekly videoed Sunday Mass, begun on Palm Sunday on our website, will continue even after the church is available for Mass, since there will be parishioners who will not feel comfortable attending physically.
- O *Indoor Masses*: since the maximum is 10 people (including the priest), we are not considering it at this time. As permitted numbers increase, we will keep you informed about what can be done.
- Outdoor Masses: we are exploring needed details of radio transmission and logistics.

Personal Prayer: We are looking for the best way to allow some time for coming into the church. However, the 10-person limit would still be in effect, and due to the difficulty of cleaning and disinfecting, only a certain part of the church would be available.

Baptisms: These will be celebrated one family at a time. We had eight families who whose ceremonies had to be postponed; three families have chosen a time for the ceremony; two are thinking about it; still three will wait until the fall.

Funerals: As of this week, funerals are now permitted, but with a 10-person limit. If families request, we offer a short commendation service in front of the church on the way to the cemetery.

Weddings: Same restrictions.

Confessions: With social distancing, confessionals cannot be used. Options are permitted to celebrate the sacrament inside or outside. We are exploring ways to offer the sacrament and will have more info in the future.

COMING BACK - UPDATE FOR SUNDAY, JUNE 7TH

[The Coming Back Overview (May 2020) is the basis for the comments below]

Please Keep in Mind:

- (1) Due to the demands of cleaning and disinfecting the church in this pandemic time, we cannot plan on our parish schedules being the same as usual.
- (2) Both Fr. Paul and Fr. Jim are in the higher risk age population (i.e., over 65 years old).
- (3) The decisions being worked on by the Diocese to resume worship and activities will be guided by the same concern for the common good and the protection of the vulnerable used for the closings in March. But, unlike them, the implementations cannot be sudden and all at once.
- (4) According to current Diocesan rules, Holy Communion is not available at any liturgical celebration (including funerals). Diocesan procedures are being prepared.

Masses:

Weekly videoed Sunday Mass. Continuing.

Indoor Masses. Currently, an initial draft of procedures to allow our people to enter the church and be seated is being reviewed. PLEASE NOTE: (1) entering the church will be only by the front entrance and will take much longer than we are used to; (2) at least every other pew cannot be used due to social distancing; (3) social distancing will need to occur in the pews where you sit; (4) we ask that you cooperate with the ushers and sit where they ask you to, not where you usually do; (5) masks will be required (and will be in the lobby)

Outdoor Masses. A transmitter has been ordered that will allow people to stay in their cars and hear Mass. The altar would be on the north side door's landing, so that people could see it. Details of traffic direction/control are being worked on. (Our parking lot's shape makes the task harder.)

Personal Prayer:

Information is the same.

Baptisms:

The first three ceremonies are to be held on June 6th & 7th, one family at a time.

Funerals & Weddings:

Information is the same.

Confessions:

The front lobby of the Church appears to be the best option. Details are on the drawing board.

Office:

Opening on Monday, June 15th, details next week (film at 11:00).

IMPORTANT:

How much we can do and how smoothly we can do it rests with all of us.

Our groups of ministers are heavily weighted to the age group of 65 and up.

Therefore, parishioners in upper teens, 20s, 30s, 40s, 50s and 60s are needed if we are to face the new challenges of our Masses.

Confirmation II

Our final chapter "Where do I go from here?" looks to the future. As we Dive Into the chapter, we are presented with the image of the African Savana and the wildebeest (made famous by the stampede in the "Lion King"). The lions know better than to get caught in the middle of the herd. They watch for those who wander from the security of the herd. It is the wildebeests' mob mentality that is its strength.

As you get older, you will begin to search outside your "herd" for new friends and experiences. The author cautions us to be careful "there are a lot of things in the world that would devour your faith, hope, and love - temptations of the world, temptations from within, and the devil himself."

As the wildebeest matures, it moves from the heavy protection at the middle of the herd toward the outer areas where they learn and practice the skills that will protect them and the herd in the future. It is the same with you. As you try your wings, as you learn the talents you've been given, you will experience increased freedom. This maturation carries more than "rights," it includes "responsibilities" to yourself and your family, your community, your Church, your nation, the world (your herd).

Those maturing wildebeests, like yourselves, are not pushed outside of the herd, but an important part of it, its safety, its longevity, its future.

A team practices so that it can perform as "one." Each member has a responsibility for the success of all. It is during practice that we learn each others' strengths and weaknesses and how to work together. We need a place we can make mistakes as we learn so the first time we try to use a skill is not during "The Big Game."

Ultimately, a game is not won by one player (they may be more important on a particular day or game, but can not do it all by themselves). What talents or gifts are you called to hone now for the important work that lies in the future God has planned and hopes for you? God has your back.

What are your plans for your future? What help will you need to get there?


