

It's a new month and the calendar continues to be filled with important events in parish life and endeavors which are deserving of your support right away and down the road.

October 2nd: Today is Respect Life Sunday. There is **Stand Up for Life** which is holding a prayerful, public witness in support of the right to life in the womb. It begins at 2:00 PM on the east side of Route 110 in Melville and finishes at 3:30 PM. Join us rain or shine.

Thank you: We express gratitude to a young parishioner, **Glenn Miller**, for heading up a replacement of two flower beds in front of the church. The work was done on Saturday, September 17th. On the scene with Glenn that day were fellow Boy Scouts and parents who supervised. The replacement work was superbly done! Kudos to Glenn for helping to keep the grounds around the church in such good order and so good looking, too.

Opportunities to Help: We are looking for women in the parish who would be inclined to serve at parish socials in the church basement. They would do so at events which have been in our schedule since last year, including **Lessons and Carols** on Sunday, December 18th and the celebration of **First Holy Communions** on Saturday, May 13th.

I am thinking that such women may want to come together at least a few times a year in the way that sodalities in the past functioned in parishes. Some parishioners may recall groups like the Rosary Altar Society which were formed with Marian devotion in mind, and perdured for generations. If you are so inclined to come together with other women in such a way, please let us know. A call to the parish center during regular business hours would be the way to respond to this query.

Bible Study: A staple of parish life for decades has been a group (both men and women) who have come together around the Scriptures. Getting to know the Scriptures better and getting to know fellow parishioners is the goal. Again, if you are so inclined, please call the parish center and register your interest. We will see if there are other parishioners who long to know the Scriptures better and see if we are able to launch a group for this purpose.

Mass Intentions: I encourage you to consider having a relative or friend (deceased or living) remembered at one of our public Masses at Saint Margaret. This would be all four weekend Masses and each daily Mass from Monday through Friday. The very best way to remember a deceased relative or friend is to assist him or her to be counted among the saints in heaven. That is what the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass does for those who are no longer with us on earth. We refer to that spiritual gift as a fruit of the Mass. If our greatest joy tis to be with the Lord without end, then it makes sense that we avail ourselves of the means that will bring that desired outcome to fruition.

The Mass Book for 2023 opens on Monday, October 24th at the parish center. There are no limitations on the number of Masses you may reserve at that time.

Enrichment Evenings: We continue to hold them on Monday nights beginning at 7:30 PM in the basement of the parish center. The next one is October 3rd. The topic is **The Church.** Catechists and any other parishioners are welcome. The remaining sessions are held on October 17th and 24th. There is **no session** on October 10th in observance of Columbus Day.

Eucharistic Revival: For those who are interested, you can find *The Mystery of the Eucharist in the Life of the Church* online. This is the document published by the United States Bishops initiating the period of the **Eucharistic Revival** in our nation. I encourage you to read this document. It's not excessively long and is quite suitable as the basis for personal reflection.

Efforts will be made to arrange for a parish retreat centered on the theme of Eucharistic revitalization at Saint Margaret at some point in 2023. I will keep you apprised of what we are able to schedule with one of the designated priest-preachers of the **Eucharistic Revival**.

Twenty Minutes with the Director/Pastor: We have already held several of these catechetical sessions for the children of the parish enrolled in religious instruction. The period starts at 9:40 AM in the church basement and gives us yet another opportunity to learn about the faith we love. It finishes up right before the 10:00 AM Mass. Then, the students and their parents attend the Mass upstairs with other parishioners. We are offering this catechesis by level. And as always, we encourage all Catholic parents to take their grade school age children to Mass every week.


Mass Book for 2023



He failed at many things: marriage, business, sobriety. He was involved in dark dealings: espionage, black market trading, opulent living, the Nazi party. Yet we know Oskar Schindler mostly for his mantel of protection over some thousand Jewish workers in his enamelware factory. Schindler originally hired Jews because they were cheap labor. In the long run those cheap workers cost him a fortune. What changed an amoral businessman into a celebrated humanitarian? Schindler saw through the lie of his culture and it repulsed him. As his grateful beneficiaries put it: "Whoever saves one life saves the world entire."

Happy birthday, Vatican II

Sixty years ago today, Pope Saint John XXIII opened the Second Vatican Council—that watershed gathering that gave us Mass celebrated in our own languages, a deeper respect for other religions, and the epiphany that laypeople are as vital to the church as its most lauded saints and clerics. In the words of Saint John XXIII, the church "allow[s] all who are enlightened by the light of Christ to understand well" their "lofty dignity and their purpose." But also, she "spreads everywhere the fullness of Christian charity ... promoting concord, just peace, and the brotherly unity of all." Ask Saint John's intercession for our church, still in the midst of growing pains.

Always move on faith

On this day in 1932, Xavier University of Louisiana—founded seven years prior as the nation's first black Catholic university by Saint Katharine Drexel—moved to its current location in the Gert Town neighborhood of New Orleans. Facing similar racist scrutiny as when she and her Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament originally established the school, Saint Katharine purchased the new property through an agent to avoid detection. Today the campus boasts a main building, convent, and library complex listed on the

National Register of Historic Places, and an administration building that is a city of New Orleans landmark. May we all display such holy boldness in our work for justice.

Forgive us our trespasses

It has now been a few months since Pope Francis apologized in Canada for the church's role in running boarding schools that profoundly hurt indigenous people. His message was both embraced for its acknowledgement of wrong and criticized for not being enough. Papal apologies are relatively new, beginning with Pope John Paul II apologizing in the 1980s for the church's role in the slave trade. Since then, popes have asked forgiveness for sexual abuse, treatment of Jews, and inaction during the Holocaust. An apology is a first step toward repairing a wrong. Reflecting on your own life, have you taken that step when needed?

TODAY'S READINGS: Ephesians 1:1-10; Luke 11:47-54 (470). "Woe to you, scholars of the law! You have taken away the key of knowledge."

Hints of heaven

On crisp fall days, walking through a path of fallen leaves, looking up at a bright blue sky, many a wayfarer has contemplated what heaven will be like. "Will I be reunited with loved ones? Will I feel joy? Will I receive justice? Will all my questions be answered? Will I meet the heroes of history and understand the mysteries of the universe? Will I see the face of God?" Of course, the specifics aren't clear, but what we do know is that Jesus promises us peace (John 14:27) and rest (Matt. 11:28); has prepared a place for us (John 14:2) that is filled with rewards (Matt. 5:12); and has assured us that "there is nothing concealed that will not be revealed." Sounds like the right place to be. Keep up the good work and you are well on your way!

Two saints for two centuries

It's not hard to confuse the two Carmelite saints who have similar names. There is Saint Thérèse of the Child Jesus, a doctor of the church, who lived in the 19th century. Also known as Thérèse of Lisieux or, affectionately, as the Little Flower, she was a French Discalced Carmelite nun. Then there is today's saint, Teresa of Jesus, a Spanish Carmelite nun and influential mystic, known as Teresa of Ávila, who lived in the 16th century and is also a doctor of the church. She was instrumental in the reform of the Carmelite order, which eventually resulted in the establishment of the Discalced Carmelites, to which the Little Flower belonged some 300 years later. They both would be happy to hear from you in prayer today.
