

Family members, please resubmit names for those who are ill. We will list them for 4 weeks, and then remove them unless told otherwise. Please note-due to privacy issues, we can include names given by the individual or a health care proxy only. Thank you. Let me mention first that we are about to start a new month. It will be eleventh month of the calendar year – November. Besides it being the month of the Thanksgiving holiday (this year on the  $24^{th}$ ), it is the month for voting – as in voting for candidates who are vying for public office. So, let me say a few words on this topic at the start of this column.

Election Day is always a Tuesday, and this year Election Day is on the 8<sup>th</sup>. It is not a presidential year as it was in 2020, but we do vote for those who represent us in Congress and those who lead us in state government. So, the first thing to say on voting is **VOTE**. Voting is a civic responsibility and some have already done so through early voting, a relatively new phenomenon which looks like it is here to stay at this point. Whether you have voted already or not, there is a civic responsibility at issue here. As citizens, we have a stake in what goes on in our country, our state and our community. Your voting franchise is your say in what happens in terms of policy internationally, nationally and locally. Exercise it carefully and judiciously.

Exercising it carefully and judiciously means that we **bring our Catholic faith** with us into the voting booth. Judge wisely by taking into account the principles of Catholicism and applying those principles to the offices and the issues which are pertinent.

Remember that the preeminent issue for Catholics is the sanctity of human life at all its stages, most especially unborn life. We have to do all we can to protect life from the moment of conception, and surely that includes supporting laws which defend children from their elimination *in utero*.

We also, obviously, consider other issues when voting. Judging rightly is what we should always strive for in our political choices regarding the common good. We are well served then in forming our consciences according to a **faith which does justice**. That faith is a Catholic faith.

As you know, our **2024 Mass Book** is **open**. Reserve Mass Intentions at the parish center. Stop by and reserve Mass Intentions for relatives and friends on their birthdays and anniversaries.

Consider Mass Intentions during the week at 9:00 AM where we have seen not a few openings in the last few weeks and more.

On Tuesday the 1<sup>st</sup> of November, the Church marks the Solemnity of All Saints, a Holy Day of Obligation. Masses are offered at 9:00 AM and at 7:00 PM.

The next day, the 2<sup>nd</sup>, is **All Souls Day.** Mass, as usual, is at 9:00 AM on that day. I encourage you to attend Mass here at Saint Margaret if your circumstances allow.

You are encouraged to remember deceased relatives and friends in our All Souls Novena of Masses. Envelopes have been mailed and additional ones can be obtained in church or through an usher. Envelopes can be returned in the collection basket at Mass or dropped off at the parish center during regular business hours.

Saint Margaret will host an **ecumenical prayer service on Sunday, November 20<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 PM.** Kindly join us as we give thanks to God for all His gifts to us in advance of the Thanksgiving holiday later that week. As usual, we will have Mass on Thanksgiving Day in the morning at 9:00 AM.

Join us in 2023 for more **Evenings of Enrichment**. We will have a series of sessions on the Holy Eucharist in observance of the **Eucharistic Revival** in the next calendar year. Watch the bulletin for more details in the weeks to come.

The Holy Eucharist is exposed in the church for Adoration on the First Thursday of the month in the afternoon. Please see the bulletin for more details. We also have periodic Holy Hours in the evening during the week. Our next one is held early in Advent (November 28<sup>th</sup>). It goes from 7:00 until 8:00 PM in the church.

We continue with our **catechetical sessions on Sunday mornings** for the children enrolled in our religious instruction program. We pray with them and their parents at the 10:00 AM Mass following the catechetical session. Please be on time for the catechesis and for Mass.



#### Hallowed be the Eve

Given its association with witches, goblins, and the like, it might seem strange that Halloween is actually a Catholic holiday. Halloween, or Hallowe'en, is an abbreviation for "All Hallows Eve," a celebration the night before All Saints' and All Souls' Days (November 1 and 2). Just like on the night before Christmas or before Ash Wednesday, people make merry on October 31—with costumes and parties for kids and adults alike—before the more solemn days to come. Take a cue this week from Mexican culture's festive *Día de los Muertos* (Day of the Dead) to pay respects with a joyful heart to those who have gone before us.

#### It's the company you keep

"It is the example of the righteous that we must make our own," instructed Pope Clement of Rome. "Seek the company of the saints, for those who seek their company shall be sanctified." Catholics believe in the communion of saints: all who have attained a place at the heavenly banquet—and from whom we seek inspiration, example, and intercession. They include Saint Francis as well as someone's Uncle Frank, Saint Gertrude the Great along with a great many grandmas. Images of both famous and ordinary saints informed the work of artist John Nava for the stunning Communion of Saints tapestries at the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels in Los Angeles; let them grace your prayer today.

Some spend the day with doors and windows wide open as a symbol of welcoming the dearly departed. In all different ways, life is celebrated, the life we shared with loved ones who have died, and the life we continue to share with them and one another in new ways. #### The struggle for racial justice continues

In 1947, the Catholic Interracial Council of Los Angeles sued the state of California to challenge the law that prohibited interracial marriages. At the time laws in 30 states made interracial marriages illegal. The challenge cited Catholic teaching to argue that racism is inherently evil and irrational. The lawsuit succeeded, a step along the long road to racial justice. Peruvian Saint Martin de Porres, born out of wedlock in 1579 to a Spanish nobleman and a formerly enslaved African woman, is patron of mixed-race people and all those seeking racial harmony. Ask Saint Martin to help us keep up the fight for racial justice.

#### An inspiration in trying times

Many lessons can be drawn from our experience these difficult years of the epidemic. Foremost among them is that we have to be there for each other. During the 1576-78 Plague of Milan, when many city officials fled the scene, Archbishop Borromeo stayed the course, not only organizing a wide-ranging clerical response to the temporal and spiritual needs of the people, but even selling his own possessions and borrowing funds to care for the many hungry, homeless, and dying souls. Dismissing concerns over infection, he made visitations across the diocese and personally ministered to the sick. What can we do today to honor his memory and serve those in need?

#### Loosen that grip

Imagine going through an entire day having left your wallet or purse at home, carrying no money of any kind (cash, credit card, or otherwise). Now imagine going through your entire life that way! More than likely, that's how Jesus lived. He had a lot to say about money, especially our relationship to it, but we never read of Jesus carrying any himself. When he's challenged about paying taxes, he asks to be shown a coin in order to respond, so he likely wasn't carrying any of his own. While Jesus did not command us to live without money, he cautioned us to use it ethically and to be careful how tightly we hold it in our hands—and our hearts.
