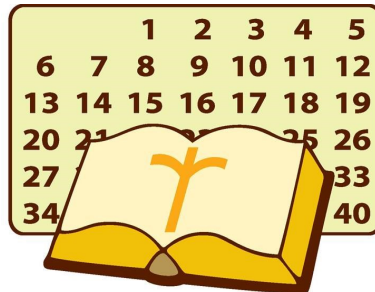

In just two days there is **Election Day** (Tuesday the 8th). Go to the polls! As I said last week – do not forget to bring your Catholic faith into the voting booth with you. We value the sanctity of all lives, most especially those not yet born. Be a pro-life voter and one concerned about the common good. We are earthly citizens, but more important is our citizenship in heaven. (cf. Phil 3:20) To be admitted to the heavenly court where the angels and all the saints delight in the company of God, our right judgments about the things of this world are necessary.

A few days ago, we marked the **Solemnity of All Saints** and the **Commemoration of All Souls**. These two days set the tone for the month of November. We live in the Kingdom inaugurated by Christ and we are aptly called the blessed. As blessed as we are though, we still cannot avoid death. And neither the judgment of God, which is particular (our judgment, that is) when we breathe our last. We may still need to be purified even though our earthly pilgrimage has been completed. How grateful then are we to have relatives and friends who can help us with their prayers and sacrifices. Death brings separation but not dissolution of the Communion brought about by Christ.

Of saints, we claim one of them for special intercession because we belong to **Saint Margaret of Scotland Parish**. We honor our patron saint on November 16th, a weekday. For parishioners who are able to attend the 9:00 AM Mass that day, I encourage you to join us then. Our communion is indeed with Christ, but we have intercessors to help guide us on our way to the Lord. The earthly lives of these heavenly intercessors can help us to be faithful amidst all the challenges we are bound to encounter now.

Just a few days before the Thanksgiving holiday, we host an **ecumenical prayer service** here at Saint Margaret. It will be held on Sunday the 20th at 7:00 PM. All are invited to join with our choir in giving thanks for the Lord's bounty in our lives.

On the national holiday, which is the 24th, we will have Mass at the usual time on weekdays – at 9:00 AM. Find the time to be with us for **Thanksgiving Day in the morning** before heading off to be with your family the rest of the day.

Advent is not that far off at this point. It starts on the Sunday after Thanksgiving which is November 27th. I ask you to consider joining us on the second day of the holy season of Advent (November 28th) in the evening for **Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament and Benediction at 7:00 PM**. As you know, we are emphasizing the Holy Eucharist as the best and truest way to meet the Lord and remain united to Him among all the trials and tribulations of life which inexorably form part of our lives. **The Eucharistic Revival deserves our fullest attention among all the acts of piety at our disposal.**

I am going to make efforts over the next few weeks to see if I can find a preacher for a parish retreat in the Spring of next year. I will try to find a priest who is a **designated preacher of the Eucharistic Revival**. I will keep you posted.

Several weeks back, I included a mention of a **bible study** in the parish. That possibility remains. If you are interested, please let us know at the parish center. We will see if we can get something off the ground in the coming months. It's not difficult to have such a sodality but we do need participants who will commit to a little bit of time every week or every month. Leadership too is crucial. If you have been a leader of a bible study before, that would be of immense help in getting a new group going.

As we had a **Lessons and Carols** last year before Christmas, we will have the same again this year. Please continue to follow the bulletin as the event draws closer. This year it will again be on a Sunday afternoon (the 18th) at 4:00 PM. Our choir and lecturers will participate.

The last Sunday of Ordinary Time (the 34th Sunday) is also known as the Solemnity of Christ the King. The date on the calendar is November 20th this year. In the time leading up to the end of the liturgical year, the Church's liturgies (Sundays and weekdays) will emphasize the last things – death, judgment, heaven and hell. Unfortunately, relatively little has been said about the **eschatological** dimension of faith in most pulpits for decades and in precious few classrooms in the same period of time – and that has been to our detriment. Faith is of enormous existential importance precisely because we **do take time seriously, and that means our choices and decisions are of no small significance to God.**

"When it comes to labor and politics, I am inclined to be sympathetic to the left, but when it comes to the Catholic Church, then I am far to the right." So said Dorothy Day—born this day 125 years ago—voicing the struggle many U.S. Catholics feel on Election Day. Though Day, born in 1897, was a suffragette, arrested for demanding that women get to vote, she never voted in her lifetime once women finally got the right in 1920. Her reasons were complicated. But the U.S. Catholic bishops offer guidance for all who wonder about the worth of their vote, insisting that "participation in political life is a moral obligation."

Wednesday, Nov 09, 2022**Build your vocation steeped in love**

For nearly a millennium, the Catholic Church has marked on this day the dedication of the Lateran Basilica, so named for the hill upon which it sits just east of the Colosseum in Rome. The cathedral of the Diocese of Rome, it is the official seat of the pope (the bishop of Rome) and is dedicated to both of the New Testament's two most famous Johns: the Baptist and the Apostle. At this halfway point of National Vocation Awareness Week,

consider the far-reaching impact of these servants honored in the Catholic Church's highest-ranking edifice. Let's dedicate ourselves as they did to spreading the Good News of love, and through our own holy vocations attain our heavenly reward!

Thursday, Nov 10, 2022**Make peace with your vocation**

Saint Leo the Great is one of the few popes remembered as the "Great." This accomplished preacher and writer was also such a skilled diplomat that he convinced Attila the Hun to spare Rome from attack in 452 and later kept a plundering Vandal army from burning the city. We recognize Saint Leo during National Vocation Awareness Week, a time to recall that God has called us each by name to love and serve in our own way. Saint Leo used his gifts to uplift Christ. How do you use yours? Sharing God's peace is a good place to start.

Friday, Nov 11, 2022**Holiness cut to fit**

Humility and generosity are the key attributes associated with many saints, and fourth-century Saint Martin of Tours is no exception. While on patrol in Gaul as a soldier in the Roman Army, it is said that Martin took pity on a half-naked beggar by cutting his officer's cloak in half and sharing it with the shivering man. The incident is immortalized in Christian art and iconography throughout Europe and became a defining image of what it means to be Christian. Martin took to heart the words of Jesus: "Whatever you did for one of these least of mine, you did for me" (Matt. 25:45). In Martin's honor, extend your compassion beyond your comfort zone today.

Saturday, Nov 12, 2022**Seek unity where possible**

For the first thousand years Christianity was one big, mostly happy family. But for a number of reasons the church was divided in the Great Schism of 1054. Saint Josaphat (c.1580-1623) was a Catholic bishop trying to reunite the Eastern Church with Rome. But, alas, he was a little heavy-handed. When he discovered a priest in his diocese was celebrating Mass according to the Byzantine practice, he had him arrested and thrown in jail. This angered a mob of unruly citizens who attacked and violently dispatched Josaphat, tossing his body in a river. We can honor his good intentions today, while perhaps choosing another approach to unity. Pray we unite in those things that matter most.

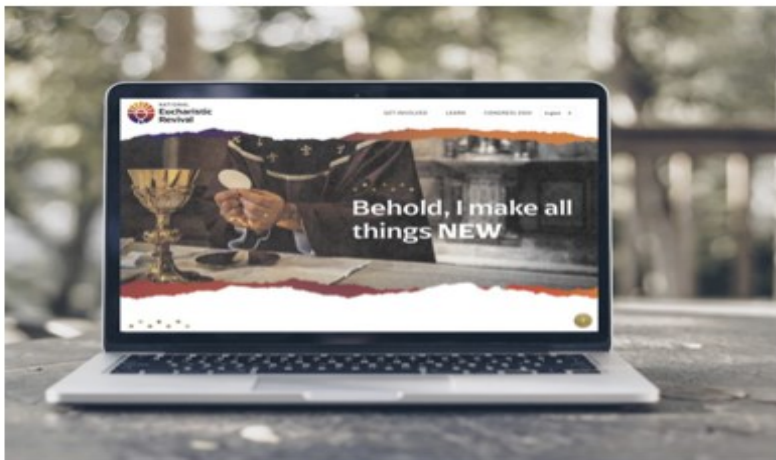
