I want to lead this week with a continuation of some of the thematic content from *The Mystery of the Eucharist in the Life of the Church*, the document of our nation's Bishops guiding our adherence to the **Eucharistic Revival**. Just recently in the bulletin, we have been following the document's content related to the *Eucharist as a Sacrifice*. This week, I want to present some of what the document says about the Real Presence of the Lord which we have in Holy Eucharist.

From the beginning, the Church has believed and celebrated according to the teaching of Jesus himself: Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life and I will raise him on the last day. For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him. It is not ordinary bread and ordinary drink that we receive in the Eucharist, but the flesh and blood of Christ, who came to nourish and transform us, to restore our relationship to God and to one another.

In the Eucharist, with the eyes of faith we see before us Jesus Christ, who, in the Incarnation became flesh (Jn 1:14) and who in the Paschal Mystery gave himself for us (Ti 2:14), accepting even death on a cross (Phil 2:8).

How can Jesus Christ be truly present in what still appears to be bread and wine? In the liturgical act known as the epiclesis, the bishop or priest, speaking in the person of Jesus Christ, calls upon the Father to send down his Holy Spirit to change the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ, and this change occurs through the institution narrative, by the power of the words of Christ pronounced by the celebrant.

To be continued, of course . . .

As this is still early in the year, I want to make known a few things now which I will comment on at greater length over the course of the coming weeks and months.

The first is that the Parish of Saint Margaret celebrates its **75th Anniversary this year**. There will be several events during 2023 to mark this momentous occasion. To start with, I established a committee of parishioners to help plan for a fitting commemoration of our anniversary. On the committee are: Frank Hartnett, Anita Hartnett, Lisa Boyd, Scott Boyd, Tom Piderit and Anita Hoehne. They have already begun meeting. Their main objective is to plan a suitable event near the liturgical remembrance of our patron saint on November 16th. As details become available on the committee's planning, I will make them known to you by way of the bulletin. So, as always, please read the bulletin carefully for information about what we will do to observe our **75th Anniversary**.

You will want to know well in advance too that in connection with the **75th Anniversary** there will be a journal published and your input will be sought. Again, please watch the bulletin for details in the coming weeks and months.

Two other matters deserve your attention at this early juncture, too. While Lent is still weeks away, parishioners will want to know that we will have a **Lenten devotion** which is linked to the **Eucharistic Revival**. It will be held on Monday nights in the church and all are invited to join us. Right now, you see flyers on the bulletin boards indicating what that devotion will be. Be sure to watch for more details in the coming weeks. The second matter is an event which will occur on June 11th. This year, the 11th of June is designated as the Solemnity of Corpus Christi. On that day, we will have a Mass at 11:00 AM, followed by an outdoor procession with the Blessed Sacrament off of our property. The procession with the Eucharistic Lord will then be followed by a reception in the auditorium (church basement), a time for parishioners to socialize together and enjoy what the New Testament calls *koinonia* (fellowship).

In the meantime, continue to be with us as we give glory to the Lord and pray with reverence at the weekly Holy Eucharist. There is not a better way on earth to share in the Lord's blessings and gifts than by going to Mass and receiving Holy Communion worthily. The weather may be cold and it takes a while for the light to break in the morning during January, but the Holy Eucharist is our consolation in season and out of season.

Many people have today off from school and work in observance of Martin Luther King Jr. Day. Why not make it a "day on" instead? Spend at least a little time working for peace and justice today, as King did every day. This is the only federal holiday that is also designated by Congress as a national day of service. The Catholic Church has embraced King's call for racial equality. The Catechism of the Catholic Church says, "Racism and every form of discrimination ... must be curbed and eradicated as incompatible with God's design." Lift a hand to help in your community, and pray that love banish hate.

Make space for silence

The *Apophthegmata Patrum* is a 1,600-year-old collection of writings known as the *Sayings of the Desert Fathers*. These texts record the teachings of the earliest Christian monks, who congregated in the desert of Egypt. The wisest among these monks was Anthony the Abbot. He wrote: "Just as fish die if they stay too long out of water, so the monks who loiter outside their cells or pass their time with men of the world lose the intensity of inner peace." When Christianity became politically accepted—and martyrdoms ceased—Anthony sought the desert to experience a different kind of sacrifice. There he found silence and solitude, too. Seek God in silence today.

Christmas is over and Epiphany has faded. In much of the Northern Hemisphere, the days are cold and dark. This is when the warmth of the Christian tradition is more important than ever. Pope Francis has often encouraged Christians to practice their faith in warmth and kindness: "Let us light fires of fraternity around which people can warm themselves," he said at a 2022 meeting with migrants in Malta. That's advice we can all take to heart—and to hearth. Can you find a word or gesture today to add positive warmth to a wintry world?

Twelve is enough

Twelve months of the year. Twelve inches in a foot. Twelve numbers on the face of a watch. We certainly like our twelves. So does the church. The most famous of course is the 12 apostles, often simply called the Twelve. There's also the 12 days of Christmas and 12 fruits of the Holy Spirit. It's not just that 12 is a handy number for grouping things, it also carries symbolic value. It signifies completion or fullness. Twelve eggs, for example, means you have a full carton. And 12 apostles means the church has everything it needs to preach the Good News. Count your spiritual blessings—by the dozen!

TODAY'S READINGS: Hebrews 8:6-13; Mark 3:13-19 (315). *"He appointed Twelve, whom he also named Apostles."*

Saturday, Jan 21, 2023

No has always meant no

As a young girl of 13 or 14, Agnes refused all suitors because she had betrothed herself to Christ. As punishment, she was taken to a brothel. One man attempted to violate her, only to be mysteriously struck blind—until Agnes restored his sight. Historical or not, this story reminds us that the scandal of child sex trafficking has always been, and still is, very much with us. Millions of girls and boys are kidnapped, bought and sold, exploited and violated for profit every year. You can help end childhood sex trafficking at the Save the Children and United Nations websites. Act in honor of courageous Agnes.


