



Our Lenten observance has begun. Let us make the best of this holy season to deepen our union with Christ by renouncing our sins and receiving the Lord's forgiveness and mercy. May we bear that forgiveness and mercy in our hearts, minds and souls and offer the gifts of forgiveness and mercy to others.

As I mentioned previously, I wanted to schedule a time here at Saint Margaret to bring the exhibit of **Eucharistic Miracles** here. I was able to do that, and I want to tell you now that the exhibit will be at Saint Margaret in late April for several days before it has to be returned to the custodians of the exhibit. On the fourth weekend of April (22/23), parishioners will be able to view the exhibit in the auditorium after all four Masses. Continue to follow the bulletin for more details on the exhibit.

As you know from reading this column, we have been giving attention to the Holy Eucharist because we are in the middle of a **Eucharistic Revival**. To assist us, we are relying on *The Mystery of the Eucharist in the Life of the Church*. I have been placing excerpts of that document in this column with regularity for a while now. I want to return to those excerpts, having already covered the topics of Sacrifice and Real Presence in previous columns. I want to return to excerpts from *The Mystery of the Eucharist* as we make our way through Lent. I continue below with what the document says regarding our response to the Holy Eucharist.

On worship during the celebration of the Mass, we find the following:

Bishops and priests have a particular duty to ensure that the Mass is celebrated in a manner befitting the sacredness of what takes place. [Priests should] be vigilant in ensuring that every liturgy be celebrated with decorum and fidelity to the liturgical books promulgated after Vatican Council II, without the eccentricities that can easily degenerate into abuses. Priest celebrants should have a prayerful understanding of the liturgical books, as well as of the feasts and seasons, and be faithful to the texts and rubrics established by the Church. In doing so, they will lead the people more deeply and reverently into the exchange that is the dialogue of the Father and the Son in the Holy Spirit.

Our gratitude is also expressed in our worship of the Blessed Sacrament outside of Mass. These forms of worship are all intrinsically related to the Eucharistic celebration. . . . We rejoice in the growing numbers of the faithful who pray in adoration before the Blessed Sacrament, a testament of faith in the Real Presence of the Lord in the Eucharist. We encourage this devotion, which helps all of us to be formed by the self-giving love we behold in the Lord's gift of himself in the Eucharist.

On this point of Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament which is plainly lauded in the document I have just cited, I take this opportunity now to encourage all of our parishioners to come to Adoration during Lent. Specifically, I am referring to the Monday Nights of Adoration and Benediction which begin on February 27th. In total, there are five (5) of these evenings with preaching all five (5) nights on different topics related to the Holy Eucharist. I urge you to see the flyers on the bulletin boards in the church for a listing of the dates and the topics. All are cordially invited to join us.

Invitations went out in the regular mail to catechists, lectors and extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion to do their best in attending these **Nights of Adoration and Benediction** which have been planned in response to the **Eucharistic Revival.** I look forward to seeing those who serve in the liturgical life and catechetical life of Saint Margaret at these nights.

This Lenten exercise is also leading us to a parish-wide participation in the **Solemnity of Corpus Christi** – one of two main celebrations of the parish's **75**th **Anniversary**. Please follow future editions of the bulletin for more details on the **75**th **Anniversary**. The first event is a Mass at 11:00 AM on June 11th. A highlight at that first celebration will be to underscore the ministries and apostolates which we have at Saint Margaret.



Guidelines for Fasting & Abstinence

All Catholics who have reached their 14th year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on all the Fridays of Lent.

All Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59 inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Good Friday.

This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day. Those whose work or health would be impaired are excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from Good Friday fast and abstinence.

Grigor Narekatsi, born near the turn of the first millennium, was an Armenian mystical and lyrical poet, monk, and theologian. He has the distinction of being venerated as a saint in the Armenian Apostolic and Catholic Churches and was declared a doctor of the church by Pope Francis in 2015. The prayer book of Gregory of Narek is a fixture in religious Armenian homes, second only to the Bible, and is considered a masterpiece of Christian spiritual literature. It has been translated into 30 languages, including English. Given the rave reviews, consider this writer-saint for your next read!

Get on board for justice

Today marks the 98th death anniversary of Homer Plessy, the man who attempted to end segregation with his legendary ride on a whites-only streetcar in New Orleans in 1892. His efforts were unsuccessful, and the following seven decades of U.S. jurisprudence included segregation as a bedrock feature. Plessy, however, is much less heralded for the fact that he was a man of faith, a black Catholic whose famous ride was organized by an interracial activist group known as the Comité des Citoyens (Citizens' Committee). Their holy disobedience was one of the first Catholic-led efforts against the

developing hierarchy of racism in the formerly French and Spanish regions of the Deep South. May the courage of Plessy and his allies be of use to us today as we continue the march toward justice.

Saint Katharine Drexel was born in Philadelphia in 1858 to a wealthy family. The Drexels had a reputation for generosity, reportedly opening their home several days a week to feed and care for people in need. They also made time every day to pray together. During a trip to Europe as a young woman, Katharine was able to have an audience with Pope Leo XIII. She asked the Holy Father to send missionaries to Wyoming. He answered, "Why don't you go?" Not long after, Katharine stunned society by leaving behind her privileged life to dedicate herself to religious life. She worked to improve living conditions and educational opportunities for African Americans and Native Americans. She left a legacy far greater than her family fortune.

Short but sweet sainthood

Lenten inspiration can come from anywhere—from scripture to Instagram, from saints to young people. While not a Bible figure or social media influencer, 15th-century Casimir of Poland happens to fit the categories of both saint and young person. Saint Casimir was a prince who was under intense pressure from his family and country to take a leading role in government and politics. But Casimir felt called to focus on prayer, study, and care for people in need. Although he had to contend with some very disappointed people, he stood firm in his decision to follow his calling. Disease cut short his life at the tender age of 25, but his example can inspire us to live out our calling and thus help fulfill his.


